103. Persian 10, Turkman style, or more likely Indian, 815/1412.

Contents: Kalīla wa Dimna animal fables, also known as the Tales of Bidpay.

Folios: 190 fols. paper, 26.5×16 cm. The original paper folios, darker in colour, are encased in a frame, 18.5×11 cm.

Rulings: 17 lines per page.

Script: *Nasta'līq* in black ink with some use of red, blue and gold. Colophon and seal: A colophon on fol. 190r dates the manuscript 815 A.H. (1412 A.D.) and gives the copyist as Murshid al-Dīn ibn Ṣadr al-Dīn al-muz(ahhib). There is a square seal on fol. 1r, presumably of an owner.

Binding: Blue lacquered boards with gold medallions and a floral border; the same front and back. The two boards, front and back, were attached at the spine with dark red leather. The binding dates

to the time when the manuscript was bound in its present format, probably in India in the 19th century.⁶⁶

Conservation: Since 1994 the manuscript has been conserved and rebound, using the original cover, and boxed.

Provenance: The manuscript's cycle is comparable with the Persian MS London, B.L. Or. 13163, which is attributed to the early 15th century.⁶⁷ B. Robinson (see bibliography) considered it to be 'Turkman" in style but it has more recently been convincingly described as Sultanate in style and attributed to India.⁶⁸

Illustration: Headpiece (fol. 1v) with floral decoration against a gold canopy with blue verticals above; pink stylised floral motifs on blue and gold below. The page has a gold three-sided frame. There are 62 miniatures distributed throughout the manuscripts: fols. 13v, 15v, 16r, 23r, 23v, 26v, 29r, 34r, 35v, 36r, 36v, 37r, 37v, 38r, 40r, 41r, 41v, 42r, 42v, 45r, 51v, 52v, 54r, 54v, 55v, 56r, 57v,
